EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Criterion – I : Curricular Aspects

Shri Shivaji Arts and Commerce College, Amravati gave due importance to the society and its educational needs. While drafting curricular aspect proper care was taken for the upliftment of the societal educational needs. Courses and syllabi were run in such a manner which ensured the overall sustainable development of society. A wide choice was given for selecting optional subjects to the students.

Hon'ble Principal, staff members are always keen to run employment and skill oriented syllabus for students benefit. While doing so due weightage is also given towards holistic approach, adoption and creation of moral values and ethical practices.

New courses were introduced at B.Com. and M.Com. level. English medium classes were started at both UG and PG level. Career oriented courses were also run to impart different skills to the students. Recently B.Voc. course was granted by UGC to the college with a whopping grant of Rs.1.70 crore.

Criterion – II: Teaching, Learning and Evaluation

Admission to the college is done through a transparent process and wide publicity details regarding the admission process are displayed on the college Notice Board (i.e. available courses, intake etc.). Admission process is uploaded on the college website and prospectus annually. The College follows University and State Government rules for admission process. The process is reviewed annually and improvements are implemented. It helps especially in balancing the enrolment of students in different subjects. Admission for reserved category students is followed as per university / state Government norms. It reflects the diversity and inclusion of SC, ST, OBC, SBC, VJNT, differently abled and economically weaker sections, minority community and sports students. Provision for UGC sponsored remedial coaching classes is available for backward and disadvantaged sections of society. All departments of the college take introductory classes to enable students to cope with the programme of their choice. The college sensitizes its staff and students on issues of gender and environment. The College has women grievance committee, grievance reddressal cell for students and staff. Tutorial classes, unit tests, home assignments, seminars, group discussions and presentations are conducted for the improvement of teaching learning process. The College has teacher-guardian committee which assures healthy relationship among teachers and students and also improves performance of the students. The College has academic committee which frames plan for new session i.e. time table, academic diary, academic audit. The college examination committee evaluates learning through unit test, home-assignment, common test which gives feedback to students regarding their performance. The College has functional IQAC which works at achieving academic excellence. To make learning skills students centric interactive learning, group learning and participatory learning activities are encouraged. Debates, seminars, lectures are organised to develop critical thinking of students. Audio-visual aids are used for classroom teaching as required. Internet facility is available for the faculty as well as students. The college library has adequate number of texts, journals, reference books, facility of online library and common internet access.

The feedback of teachers by the students is taken. This feedback is analysed and evaluated by the feedback committee. The College management encourages faculty members to enhance quality in professional development i.e. refresher course, orientation course and

other training programmes. The research promotion cell of the college encourages faculty for academic and research growth i.e. minor and major projects, participation in seminars, conferences and symposia, publishing research articles in journals.

At present the college has a regular Principal and 32 faculty members, 02 are Professors, 11 are associate professors, 19 are assistant professors, 27 are Ph.D., 07 teachers are NET/ SET .

Criterion – III : Research, Consultancy and Extension

It has always been the endeavour of the institution to strive for development and keep pace with all the progressive trends and update the faculties of the institution in research and extension activities.

The college has formed a five members committee for Research Promotion. The committee monitors all the research activities with the help of IQAC and the Principal and motivates and encourages all the teachers of the senior college to do Ph.D., Major and Minor Research Projects, attend conferences, seminars, workshops and present research papers, as well as send research articles in the refereed journals.

There are 27 (81.81%) doctorates in the institution. Three teachers are doing major research projects and 18 teachers have completed minor research projects and 3 minor research projects are ongoing. The faculty have presented 204 research papers in national and international conferences and almost 150 research papers in national and international journals and 13(40.62 %) teachers are recognised as Ph.D supervisors.

In order to facilitate smooth progress and implementation of research schemes, the college allocates the grants received from the UGC funding agency and also allows the teacher to go on FIP.

The staff is always willing to participate in various conferences of interdisciplinary nature and they have also presented research papers. The teaching staff also participates with their research papers in the conferences and seminars at home and abroad.

The college has introduced a research journal entitled "Research Awakening" and the editorial board is formed. The faculty have also published books and have written chapters in books as well. Almost 31 books have been published by the faculty in the institution. Two teachers of the college have received Maharashtra Government awards. The college provides facilities like library well equipped with computers, net services and laboratories.

The college is always in the forefront of extension activities. The college was established by Late Dr. Panjabrao Deshmukh with a very noble aim to uplift the poorest of the poor by giving them education. The college is thus always ready to serve the humanity and the society at its best. The NSS and NCC are always active, whether it is flood relief, women empowerment or cleanliness drive. The institution has maintained this vision by adopting a girl student from Bhugaon and accommodated in the hostel.

Dr. Sabane, one of our faculty members has been elected as a Corporator and used the platform for social cause. Dr.Ambhore is similarly appointed on "Annabhau Sathe Biography Committee" by the state government. The college also ensures the involvement of the community in its outreach activities and contribute to community development through the NSS camps held every year. The villagers learn and participate in the activities like "Swaccha Bharat Abhiyan" and water preservation programmes. The institution has received SGB Amravati University award for the cleanliness drive.

The institution is active in the collaborations with other institutions. The college has signed an M.O.U with Dhanwate National College, Nagpur.The eminent personalities like Dr. Sadanand More, President, Akhil Bhartiya Marathi Sahitya Sammelan, Uttam Kamble, Editorial Director, Sakal Daily, etc. have visited and guided the students.

The college has linkages and placement facilities to promote the students to pursue further career after graduation and post graduation. The Placement Cell is active in facilitating placements of the students.

Criterion-IV: Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The College has adequate land of 6.2 Acres in the center of the city. The college has created and upgraded the infrastructure during the post accreditation period. The college strategically developed the infrastructure through designing the Master Plan for forthcoming expansions. The Building Committee of the college with the assistance of Building Section of Parent organization takes care of the maintenance of the Buildings. The College has infrastructure of 30 Class Rooms, Seminar Hall, Auditorium, Separate Library Building, Boys and Girls Hostel, Canteen, Girls Common Room, Gymnasium and Playground for Holly ball etc.

The College Library plays an important role in teaching, learning and research process of the college. The Library is computerized with SOUL 2.0 library software and digitized the collection on Dr. PanjabraoDeshmukh, First Union Agriculture Minister, India. The college Library has developed website of "Dr.PanjabraoDeshmukh Social Science Digital Library". The Library provides access to e-resources through N-LIST consortia of INFLIBNET. The Library has rich collection of more than 55,000 Books with Spacious reading room facility; Free Internet Facility. The Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC) is developed to search the library collection. The Library gives "Dr. S. R. Ranganathan Best Reader Award" to promote reading habits among the students. Library Committee has taken initiative to modernize the Library.

The college has developed Information and communication Technology infrastructure in the college. The central computer center of the college has 50 computers with high speed internet facility of optical fiber connection (OFC). The Language Lab for developing communication skill in English was setup with 11 computers and e-learning software i.e. Orell – ODLL Language Lab software. The GIS-Remote Sensing Lab was established with e-learning software like GIS software. The college acquired various software like Tally Accounting Software, office automation software, SOUL software for Library, Windows 2012 R2 server software, Windows 8, Office 2010 License software. The college has provided computing and Internet facility through LAN connectivity. The application of ICT in teaching & learning is promoted through use of LCD projector in Six Departments in which two are common for all departments. (Seminar Hall and central Computer Center).

Criterion – V : Student Support and Progression

Keeping the student in focus, the college concentrates on the overall development of the students and syllabus, co-curricular activities are framed accordingly.

The college Prospectus has all the necessary information along with the Mission, Goals and Objectives, Vision, academic calendar, fee structure. Scholarship facilities are given to the physically challenged students as per their needs.

English Language lab, internet facility, Digital library are available for the students. To promote writing skills among students the college publishes 'Shiv-Vani' annually. The students also submit their articles in the said magazine to show their creativity.

18 students have passed NET/SET examinations, 43 students secured position in the SGBAU merit list, 11 students passed competitive examinations.

It is feather in our cap that 18 Games and Sports activities are conducted in the college. In the last five years, the college has received 68 colour holders. Three students have represented India in Archery at the International Level. The college has 04 colour holders to its credit in cultural activities.

Students' Grievance Committee, Womens' Grievance Redressal Committee, Anti Ragging Committee are functioning in the college.

The results of the college in University examinations are very impressive, the graph is going higher and higher. There are **07** post graduate departments as well as M.Phil. in two subjects i.e. Commerce and Economics in the college.

In this academic session, the college has been granted B.Voc. Course with a financial assistance of Rs 1.70 crore by the UGC. This remarkable achievement has made the college proud.

The students participate in Youth Festival, Indradhanush (State Level Cultural Programme), Avishkar (Research Competition), etc.

Teachers' feed back is obtained from the students.

The college conducts medical and physical tests of the students regularly to make the students aware about the environment and its problems in the programmes organised by the college.

Other than this, the admission process is publicised through displaying it on local cable network. Information is also prominently displayed on the Notice Board in the college premises. The college ensures transparency in the admission process following the university / State Government rules. The students are called to secure their admissions on stipulated dates. It is undertaken by admission committees for various courses / programmes. Programme-wise separate registers are maintained for keeping the record of admission process. And college thus ensures transparency in the admission process.

 - After the declaration of results of the qualifying examination, course—wise application forms are invited. The students are selected for admission according to cut off criteria i.e. first cum first basis. The cut off of B.A. I 45% and B.Com.I 60%. In the admission process of the students from Reservation category, the college follows university / state government norms. (The above described selection process is followed for all the courses and reservation policy is followed as Open 48% OBC 19%, SC 13%, ST 7%, VJNT 11%, SBC 2%)

- 2.1.4 Is there a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and student profiles annually? If yes, what is the outcome of such an effort and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?
 - Yes, the college has mechanism to review the admission process and student profiles each year. The mechanism of review is monitored through the same constituted admission committee for each programme / course. It checks student's tendency to change / alter the combination of group of subjects to be offered and as this practice was observed generally after the completion of admission process that too after midterm without any prior notice to the office or admission committee members. It affected the result and also decreased number of enrolled students in various courses. It is hence necessitated to adopt Review of the Admission Process and also the student's profile. Efforts are therefore being made by concerned Admission Committee to strictly control and avoid alterations in subjects by interaction with students as regards to their choice of the subject and confirming his subjects before closure of admission process. This has contributed in improvement of admission process as well as student profile and performance of the results of various subjects.
- 2.1.5 Reflecting on the strategies adopted to increase / improve access for following categories of students, enumerate on how the admission policy of the institution and its student profiles demonstrate / reflect the National commitment to diversity and inclusion of SC/ST, OBC, Women, Differently abled, Economically weaker sections, Minority community, Any other.

Preference is given to sports persons wherever possible. The percentage of girls students to boys has been increasing each year, at present it is more than 50%. This increase in the enrolment of the girls students is due to safety measures at its priority taken by the college administration.

After having gone through details of admission of various programmes offered by the college during the last four years, it is observed that trend for admission at entry level has tremendous growth with more than 100% admissions as per intake at UG and PG level. Especially it is to be mentioned that B.Com. (English Medium) has tremendous growth and attraction for future job opportunities / placements. Same is observed in Mass Communication as well as PG in Geography, Political Science, English, Home Economics, Economics.

2.2 **Catering to Diverse Needs of Students**

2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

- Institution does its best to take care of differently-abled students by providing barrier free environment and ensures adherence to government policies in this regard.
- Ramp is provided in the college.
- Literature in braille available in college library
- Teaching and non-teaching staff are ever-ready to help and assist such students.
- College provides needful facility to these students by providing comfortable seating arrangement during examination as well avails him the writer if he requires.
- These students also have reservation in the admissions.
- Every teacher pays attention towards these students through teacher guardian committee.

2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If yes, give details on the process.

Yes, there is a provision in this college for assessing students' knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme. The teachers review the syllabus studied by the student in the last qualifying examination and engage a few lectures to cover the basics of every topic before starting teaching of the current syllabus of that particular programme. So that students are enabled to cope up with the programme to which they are enrolled. The teachers also encourage students to come forward with their difficulties and provide counselling throughout the year.

2.2.3 What are the strategies drawn and deployed by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice? (Bridge / Remedial / Add-on / Enrichment Courses, etc)

The College has adopted and deployed strategies to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students to enable them to cope up with the programme of their choice. This is done through remedial coaching and career oriented courses i.e. Add-on. Career counselling and coaching for competitive examinations like MPSC / UPSC, NET/SLET, etc. are also provided to students.

2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment, etc.?

The college has sensitized its staff and students on issues such as gender / inclusion and environment, etc. For gender sensitization, the college has constituted Women Grievance Committee / Grievance Redressal Cell for students and Grievance Redressal cell for staff. These committees look into the grievances received (if any) from the students, teachers, non-teaching staff and girl students. Through this, holistic and healthy environment is always maintained in the college.

2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational / learning needs of advanced learners?

Slow and advanced learners are identified on basis of their performances in frequent oral question - answer sessions conducted by the subject teacher in the classroom. Also they are identified through their performance in Unit Test, Home Assignment, Seminars, Group Discussions and Presentations. Advanced learners are further encouraged to acquire latest knowledge in their discipline. The teachers give tips for developing reading, learning, innovative writing, paper presentation, ICT enabled learning, reading and are asked to refer books, career counselling and guidance for competitive examination is also provided to such students. Advanced learners are also advised to help and support slow learners in improving their ability.

- 2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections, etc)?
 - The college has Teacher-Guardian committee which also plays the role of maintaining tutor-ward relationship. This helps in paying attention to students from disadvantaged sections, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections, etc. This committee provides feedback forms to the guardians, to collect the data and analyses the academic performance of these students. This mechanism assures the healthy and harmonious relationship among students and teachers and helps a lot in encouraging these students to improve their academic performance who are at the risk of dropout.

2.3 Teaching – Learning Process

- 2.3.1 How does the college plan and organise the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc).
 - As soon as the college reopens, the college plans and organises the teaching learning and evaluation schedules.
 - The IQAC frames annual plan for the new session in the beginning. The annual calendar is prepared as a part of college annual plan. Teaching plan i.e. Time Table is formed according to the workload of each subject distributed to each individual teacher of respective departments. The teaching plan includes monthly and term-wise teaching schedules. Units and topics per unit of the paper allotted to a teacher are distributed into available teaching days in an academic year. Every teacher follows the Time-Table and maintains the record of lectures taken in the academic diary which is provided to them by the college. The head of the various departments keenly monitors teaching and suggest mid-term corrections wherever necessary, so that syllabus allotted to a teacher is completed within time to ensure that students get sufficient time for preparation. The monitoring is done by the academic planning and academic audit committee. At the individual level the teacher thus maintains the academic diary to record information regarding personal details, teaching plan, time table, work load, co-curricular and extra co-curricular activities, research work, books read, university and college administration works, exam results and leave records in addition to daily lectures.
 - Learning is evaluated continuously through unit tests, home assignments, group discussions, seminars, etc. The examination schedule of the college is prepared and notified to the students by displaying it on the notice board. The schedule is strictly followed throughout the year.
 - The college examination committee monitors conduct of examination and valuation and its record is maintained. Students get appropriate feedback from the teachers regarding their performance.

2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching-learning process?

Under Internal Quality Assurance system of the college IQAC is constituted in the
college and is very functional. It aims at continuous improvement of quality and
achieving academic excellence. The IQAC monitors overall academic performance
of the college. The IQAC annually prepares AQAR and submits it to NAAC office.
The IQAC adopts participatory approach in quality management, strategies in all
academic and administrative aspects.

2.3.3 How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

- Student centric learning is the first and foremost objective of the college. Teachers establishe cordial relation by reaching out to students founded on mutual trust and goodwill.
- Through personal interactions with teachers, students are facilitated to voice their difficulties in learning and grievances. It is also supported through feedback mechanism. Students are always encouraged to open up and to let the faculty and head of the college administration know-off what is to be improved. In general students are provided extra-coaching and supported by supplying appropriate learning material wherever possible. Teachers of this college are skilled and competent in using various teaching learning methods such as interactive methods like group discussion, question and answer method. In the college there is also project-based learning as per norms of the university. In the college ICT based learning method is used in Commerce, Mass Communication, Geography, English and Economics departments.
- For acquisition of skill and knowledge management skills, the college organises various programmes and guest lectures of eminent academicians on variety of topics including personality development.
- Through NSS, NCC, Sports and excursion tours, the college contributes in developing social responsibility, independent learning and personality development of the student. The students play important role in institutional activities as a representatives of various committees of the college like Students' Council and Societies of various subjects. As independent learning there is a provision for monitoring of students in the college by arranging inter-collegiate *Bhav-geet* (singing) and debate competitions in the name of Dr. Panjabrao Deshmukh, founder of Shri Shivaji Education Society, Amravati and Dr. Jwalaprasad, first Principal of Shri Shivaji Arts and Commerce College, Amravati respectively.
- Thus learning is made more student-centric by laying stress on specific learning outcomes for all courses and making it more participatory and interactive. Almost all departments organize various types of academic and cultural events like paper reading, debates, skits, etc. that help students in chisseling their personality. The inter-college and inter-departmental academic and extra-curricular programmes are conducted to increase creativity and to develop competence in students.

2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

- The college makes every effort to nurture critical thinking and creativity and scientific temper among the students through giving them opportunity to participate in debate, seminars and even the lectures of eminent personalities are organised based on current issues and problems which makes student possible to explore their ideas and also enjoy the fruitful lectures of expert people. The college makes an arrangement for excursion and educational tours annually for students. Various cultural programmes are organised around the year where students not only participate but are very actively involved in organizing and handling programmes such as welcome parties for freshers, annual gathering, participate in youth festival of the university where they get a chance to show their talent in every activity like drama, debate, dancing, etc. The college publishes annual college magazine entitled 'Shiv-vani' where students are given opportunity to express their creativity through their writings. The college also aims to start wall magazine on the anniversaries of great personalities dead and alive. The students in the college are motivated by teachers to achieve life-long learning and innovations by writing research articles. The teachers are also sponsoring awards for good creative writing.
- 2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? E.g. Virtual laboratories, e-learning resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT) open educational resources, mobile education, etc.
 - Modern technological aids are used by the faculty for effective teaching. Efforts are being made to enhance the use of such aids to make the teaching effective and also to improve the learning experience such as:
 - ❖ Computers with internet facility availed in all departments.
 - Use of multi-media projectors i.e. LCD
 - Use of power point presentations.
 - ❖ Language laboratory (communicative English).
 - The college aims to develop smart classrooms so that faculty can access smart classrooms for ICT-enabled teaching learning method.

2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?

- There are various means for the teachers and students to keep pace with recent developments in their respective subjects. To keep pace with new and advanced level of knowledge and skills, students and teachers make use of latest journals, reference books, e-books and e-journals facility from the college library. Even students are advised and motivated to avail the internet facility on their cell-phones so that they can immediately have access to recent development in subject or it can be a ready recknor for them.
- The students are encouraged to attend and participate in seminars and extension lectures organised regularly by almost every department to update their knowledge. This helps students to collect information on latest development in their subject of

interest. Seminars on current issues are arranged from time to time in college. Prominent scholars and people are invited to share their knowledge for the benefit of students.

- The students are assigned various tasks, such as writing articles on State, National and International events and collections for college and wall magazine. They are also advised to interact with resource persons during seminars, conferences, workshops. Such interactions are fruitful to the students and also to the faculty to enrich their level of knowledge and skills.
- The departments of Geography, Sociology, Mass Communication, Home Economics, Economics, Commerce, Marathi and History conduct field work and excursion.
- The department of Commerce, Mass Communication conduct project work included in their curriculum. Some of the departments like Economics, History, Sociology organize study excursion to acquaint the students with the changes taking place.
- The college has central library through which students are getting books for reference while learning. The teachers provide guidelines to the students about how to use the reference books for enhancing their knowledge. The college library has subscribed to various journals related to different subjects. In addition to this, books and magazines are purchased by the college on regular basis for knowledge up-gradation. Newspapers and internet are used regularly to keep track of the latest advancements in a particular subject.
- The teachers in the college collect information related to the curricular and recent development in the respective subject and provide the information to the students. In this way regular updating of the learning is maintained by the faculty and students.
- The faculty members update their knowledge by attending workshops, seminars, orientation and refresher courses, guest lectures of learned scholars, paper presentation and publications. Undertaking research projects, research supervision and organizing and attending conferences at National and International level.
- The faculty members are also invited as resource persons for seminars and These interactions strengthen the involvement of the teachers in curricular activities from which teachers and students are benefited.

- 2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students benefited) on the academic personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counselling / mentoring / academic advise) provided to students?
 - The students are advised by the teacher to choose stream, subjects, group of combination of subjects. This is done by knowing their area of interest while interacting with them.
 - They are provided remedial coaching to cope up with the difficulties which crops up in learning of the particular subject especially English.
 - Students are also guided to take coaching from expert teachers in their related subject.
 - This academic support is provided initially when students appear before the admission committee and it continues through out the year.

Personal and psycho-social support is provided to students by:

- Addressing and solving their problems by the senior teachers.
- The teachers make efforts to support them financially particularly students of the weaker section.
- Career and counselling cell helps students to cope better with demands and challenges of stiff competitive surroundings.
- The teachers also mentor students from their professional point of view.
- Guidance services are provided to students by UGC sponsored remedial, career and counselling cell (entry in services).
- 2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches / methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faculty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?
 - Project-based learning and experimental learning like field work, visits to industries, socio-economic survey, survey and organizing students' seminars based on the (Geography, Commerce, Sociology, Home-Economics, Economics, curriculum. Mass Communication)
 - Interactive method, audio-visual mode of teaching and ICT based learning. 2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

- The College Library has subscribed to various journals and e-journals related to different subject which helps to augment effectively the teaching learning process.
- Procurement of books and magazines, journals (national, international, state) by the college regularly for updating of the knowledge.
- Newspapers and internet are used regularly to keep in touch with the latest advancement in various subjects.
- There is a separate periodical and reference section which helps to research supervisor, research scholars in their knowledge up-gradation.
- Students are supported by providing library resources for competitive exams with facility of access to online library and internet.
- Old question papers are made available to the students of various subjects.
- Copies of syllabi are also available.
- Latest acquisitions are made known by the library staff and librarian immediately to both teachers and students.
- Information regarding new books, new arrivals is given through college notice board or library notice board.
- Departmental libraries (faculty members have contributed their books from their personal collection) faculty and students are benefited.
- Special provisions are made in annual budget for enrichment of library. Due to use of library resources effective enhancement of teaching learning occurs.

2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

- Besides the regular staff, contributory teachers are also appointed particularly for self financed courses to complete the curriculum. Extra classes are also engaged besides the regular classes to complete the syllabus.
- To develop the skills and personality of students they are encouraged to participate in extracurricular and co-curricular activities which results in challenge for completing the syllabi. To overcome this problem, the teachers conduct extra classes.
- Even teachers go for training programmes, faculty development programmes which creates problem in completing syllabi that too is also overcome by engaging extra classes.
- Slow learners mostly coming from remote areas and weaker section of the society face problem in learning. It is also overcome through remedial coaching, counselling, advising and encouraging them. In this way conducive learning environment is

generated and it ensures accountability and it induces transparency in the teaching – learning process.

2.3.11 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

- The institute monitors and evaluates the quality of teaching learning through IQAC which provide feedback format in questionnaire method to students. Feedback of teachers by the students is taken anonymously in mid-term. It includes performance in academics, extra-curricular and co-curricular activities and also in the field of social involvement. This feedback is analysed and evaluated by the feedback committee report of which is perused by the principal. In turn the outcome of the feedback is informed to each teacher for future improvement and encouragement if needed and in case of the good performance of the teacher is given due appreciation.
- The Principal independently holds meetings of the departmental heads and takes feedback on the teaching – learning progress of each department.
- Thus the method adopted by college as mentioned has been found to be very effective in monitoring and evaluating quality of teaching – learning.

The regular faculty is employed strictly following the norms of eligibility as per UGC, university rules, government of Maharashtra. The same eligibility condition is followed for the recruitment of CHB. Appointment of teachers, full-time including principal of affiliated colleges is made in accordance with the provisions of Maharashtra University Acts. However, if any subject where faculty post is vacant due to retirement of any teacher or additional workload and the recruitment of new teacher does not take place in time, then the college administration takes initiative and is authorised to appoint CHB teachers according to rules and norms of UGC, Government, University and due care is also taken to fulfil the backlog of the reservations.

2.4.6 Has the institution introduced evaluation of teachers by the students and external Peers? If yes, how is the evaluation used for improving the quality of the teaching – learning process?

The college has introduced evaluation of the teachers by students through analysis of the feedback taken from the students by filling the questionnaires provided to the students. Also evaluation of teachers is done by the parent society. The analysis is made by the feedback committee and outcome is communicated to individual teacher which helps him to improve further the teaching quality. Thus this evaluation helps to improve the quality of teaching – learning process.

2.5 **Evaluation Process and Reforms**

2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

- Information regarding the evaluation method and the schedules of examination are mentioned in the prospectus at the time of their admission and the same is mentioned in the academic calendar during opening of the session.
- The methods adopted for evaluation are displayed on the college notice board. Regular information of examination is also a feature of teaching, learning and evaluation of the college.
- The teachers of every subject announce their schedules in their respective class and also explain to them the pattern of questions for the unit test, home-assignment and terminal examinations and methods of evaluation.
- Model question papers are also set for college examination strictly according to university question paper pattern and evaluated in the same way, so that students have first hand experience of the examination. Thus students are aware of the evaluation process.

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

- The college is affiliated to SGB Amravati university and the examination reforms are introduced by the university in 2010. The University started semester pattern. Syllabus changes made in 2011-12 are also applicable to the college. In some faculty semester pattern is applied i.e. PG in Commerce and PG in Mass Communication, but in some faculty like Arts annual pattern is followed.
- The college cannot make evaluation reforms on its own but can provide inputs to the university regarding evaluation reforms through their faculty working on various

bodies of the university like Board of Studies, Management Council, Academic Councils and Senate.

- 2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?
 - The institution ensures effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university by communicating the evaluation methods to the students and other members of the college by displaying it on the notice board, circulating letters, and self-appraisal reports.
 - The evaluation reforms of the university are followed in the best of spirit. When the college conducts its own exam the evaluation is fair, the students are satisfied by showing them the evaluated performance. Every doubt about evaluation is made clear to the student. Whenever unit tests and common test are given their performance is communicated to students to encourage them and counsel them for better future performance.
- 2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative evaluation approaches adopted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.
 - University is the sole authority for implementation of reforms in examination and evaluation, but faculty members who are part of academic bodies of the university actively take initiative for reforms.
 - Still college brings positive change in the evaluation methods, adopt both formative and summative methods of evaluation.
 - Formative approach of evaluation is followed by evaluating performance of students' achievement through group discussions, seminars. Through this evaluation lot of information is achieved regarding performance of students particularly after completion of units. The teachers get some idea about the student and thus it becomes easier for him to take necessary steps in their studies.
 - The summative evaluation is done during common test. Even if a student does not perform well then extra chance is given to him for evaluation. All faculty members follow the formative approach to understand the students' performance through (1) group discussion, (2) home assignment (3) seminar (paper-presentation) (4) verbal test and (5) Excursion Tours.
 - In summative evaluation of unit test, if a student fails to perform well then he has a chance to appear for common test to improve his performance for annual exam. Thus, in this way the institution uses the formative and summative evaluation approach.
- 2.5.5 Enumerate on how the institution monitors and communicates the progress and performance of students through the duration of the course / programme? Provide an analysis of the students results / achievements (Programme/coursewise for last four years) and explain the differences if any and patterns of achievement across the programmes/courses offered.
 - The institution monitors the progress of the students by conducting unit test, home assignment, common test, seminars and communicate their performance to them and their parents in students and parents meeting. Even parents are informed regarding their performance through teacher guardian scheme (tutor-ward).

- In the beginning to the academic year, the college assesses the previous year's performance of the students by analysing the university results subject-wise and classwise.
- The answer books of the unit tests are evaluated by the respective subjects teacher and returned to the students. The record of their marks is kept by the teacher. They are advised to communicate their performance to their parents as mentioned above.

- When we glance at the results of the university examination of the college during the last five years as regards to B.A.I, B.A.II and B.A. III classes, it seems interesting that percentage, the results have been improved and there is an increase in percentage of results i.e. from 8.57% to 21.05 at an average percentage result i.e. 20.3 for the class B.A.I, from 29.63 to 38.24 at an average percentage result i.e. 33.25 for the class B.A.II and from 34.62% to 41.14 at an average percentage result i.e. 41.05 for the class B.A.III. Thus there has been increase in percentage result during last five years and average increase is 10 to 12% from entry level to final year.
- As per as MA in English is concerned as most of the students come from rural and Marathi speaking background, English is very difficult for them and is a very tough subject for learning and they have to secure 55% of marks, therefore the tendency of the students is to appear for selective papers out of four papers by availing the facility of ATKT. Therefore when we observe above table of MA in English the percentage of result appears below average.
- As per the table, results of MA Economics and Political Science are better. It is about 50% for MA Economics and at an average of 40% for MA Political Science i.e. above average. PG in Geography and Home Economics show tremendous performance in the percentage result. At an average percentage result i.e. about 84% for MA Geography and an average percentage above 70% for MA Home Economics. Both the PG courses in Geography and Home Economics are practical subjects and students show interest and also score more marks. Hence this performance of result of both the subjects is best one amongst all PG courses. It is to be specially noted that except MA in English all the PG are in Marathi Medium and therefore they show better results.
- When it is observed the University result of B.Com. I, II and III of the College (Marathi Medium), there is an increase from 27.35% to an average percentage result 50.54% for B.Com.I, from 14.54% to at an average percentage result 56.7% for B.Com. III and from 38% to at an average percentage result about 77.95 for B.Com. III. In case of B.Com English Medium it has been observed that there is an increase in the percentage result 33.33% to an average percentage result 54.51 at entry level and from 93.33% to an average percentage of 92.45% for B.Com III. As per as M.Com. both in English and Marathi Medium there is average percentage result 90% to 92.5%, which shows excellent performance of the students.
- In case of BJMC I, II, III as it is a professional course students are much sincere and punctual in their performance of results maintaining and average percentage result i.e. 93.%.
- PG course of MJMC has very excellent performance. There is increase in the percentage result from 71.88% to an average percentage result i.e. 90%.
- 2.5.6 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioural aspects, independent learning, communication skills, etc)

- The internal assessment is conducted by the faculty members keeping in mind the following aspects and factors of students performance during the academic year.
 - Class attendance
 - Class assignments
 - ❖ Marks obtained in unit test and common test exam.
- The marks obtained in the internal assessment are regularly communicated to the students in class. Counselling is done wherever necessary by teachers on a one-to-one basis.
- There is significant improvement during the last four years in the overall development of students. They are themselves taking initiative to assess themselves continuously focussing on appearing for test and knowing their performance which has resulted in the improvement of results.
- Inspite of all the aspects of students assessment, their behavioural aspects, independent learning and communication skill are also taken into consideration during the assessment of student.
- Does the institution and individual teachers use assessment / evaluation as an indicator for evaluating student performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning? If 'yes' provide details on the process and cite few examples.
 - Yes, the institution and individual teachers use the following assessment and evaluation as an indicator for evaluating students performance, achievements of learning objectives and planning.
 - Marks in internal exams
 - Classroom performance
 - **❖** Behavioural aspects
 - **❖** Communication skills
 - * Activities and performance in NSS, Sports, NCC, along with Curricular activities like seminars, GDPI
 - ❖ Certificate, cash/book/kind rewards are received by students for good performance.
- 2.5.8 What are the mechanisms for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation both at the college and University level?
 - The student places the grievance regarding evaluation before examination committee which resolves it in consultation with the concerned teacher. If the student is not satisfied, he/she voices the grievance directly to the principal, who resolves the issue after due consideration. Besides this the college has general grievance redressal cell. The grievance is handed over to the examination committee by the cell. In case of a grievance regarding the university examination, the teacher concerned, helps the

student to present the grievance directly to the redressal cell of the university for revaluation. The university has provision of supplying to the aggrieved student, the photo copy of the answer book which is assessed by the subject teacher concerned, to confirm whether the grievance is genuine in which case, the student is advised to approach the university for the re-valuation of the answer book.

2.6 **Student performance and Learning Outcomes**

- The college has clearly stated learning outcome which is stated in vision and mission statement of the college which is included in the college prospectus i.e. blending tradition with modernity. The student and staff are made aware of this through prospectus.

 - ❖ To make students gain knowledge for the use of welfare of mankind.
 - ❖ To create in student the spirit of enterprise.
- Whereas, on one side college offers traditional courses with few on high quality teaching on the other side through career oriented courses, research and innovative programmes, the college wants to reach out to cross-section of the society.

2.6.2 How are the teaching, learning and assessment strategies of the institution structured to facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcomes?

- The teaching, learning and assessment strategies of the college are structured to facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcome through
 - Well-equipped computer laboratories.
 - ❖ Well equipped library.
 - Spacious, well-ventilated classrooms.
 - ❖ Audio-visual teaching aids.
 - * Class test, home assignments, unit test, group discussion and interactive sessions.
 - ❖ College common test examination and annual examination of the university.

2.6.3 What are the measures / initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (quality jobs, entrepreneurships, innovation and research aptitude) of the courses offered?

- Introduction of self financing courses.
- Introduction of UGC funded career oriented courses.
- Language laboratory for Communicative English, computer laboratory for computer based learning in Commerce department and Mass Communication.

- College Library helps students to inculcate innovation by allowing them to explore and experiment innovatively.
- The college magazine provide students platform to give expression to their innovative and creative flight.
- The college organises industrial or management institutions visits i.e. especially in the Commerce department, Mass Communication, Home-Economics and Geography and interactive talks are organised by inviting industrial executive to instill entrepreneurship among students.
- The college NSS, NCC wing regularly organize programmes to enhance the social relevance of the courses.
- Conducting seminars, project works and counselling on curriculum and employment options for students.
- Soft skill development ensures overall personality development which is conducted in both NSS programmes and sessions of soft skill in language laboratory.
- The college understands its responsibility in the socio-economic parameters. Students are guided regarding the future prospectus of various subject options. They are sensitized on the social responsibility through popular lectures.
- The students are motivated through personality development programmes.
- The students are encouraged to participate in activities for social and community services.

2.6.4 How does the institution collect and analyse data on student learning outcomes and use it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning?

- The college has IQAC to collect and analyse data on student learning outcomes. The college uses this data to find advanced and slow learners and plan separate strategies for them. It ensures to improve learning outcomes of both categories. To remove their learning barriers, the college provides them remedial coaching, career counselling, Peer learning, etc. minimum attendance limit for students to reduce their absenteeism.
- Extra classes are engaged for weak students to solve their problems.
- The periodic evaluation of teachers help in the improvement of learning outcome.

2.6.5 How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes?

- The college has clearly defined set mechanism to monitor the learning outcomes.
- Attendance is made compulsory.
- In tutorials communication skills are taught.
- Counselling is given to slow learners. Parents of such students are communicated.

- The faculty members are encouraged to monitor the academic progress of each students.
- The college monitors the achievement of learning outcomes through IQAC and academic committee which ensures the achievement of learning outcomes by conducting class test, holding class discussions, taking remedial classes, taking feedback from students.

The college makes every effort to enable the students to mould their personality by developing their talents and skill. All the teachers of the college are also aware of their responsibilities and obligations to the society and nation. Every teacher works hard to inculcate moral, cultural, intellectual, social and spiritual knowledge among the students. All the activities of the college bear some social, cultural, moral, spiritual and national relevance. The college takes hard work to make the students responsible citizen of the nation. All these efforts and hardwork have resulted positively which is reflected in the quality of alumni and their achievements.

 - ❖ The proposals for recognition of research centres of various departments have been submitted to Sant Gadge Baba Amravati University.
- 3.1.2 Does the institution have a research Committee to monitor and address the issues of research? If so, what is its composition? Mention a few recommendations made by the committee for implementation and their impact.
 - The institution has formed a five member committee for the Research Promotion Cell. The members are Dr. B. T. Gawande, Dr. B. T. Ambhore, Dr. S. B.Prabhune, Dr. K. R. Phule and Dr. M. V. Mete. This committee monitors and addresses the issues of research such as promoting the minor, major projects, to hold seminars, conferences, workshops and publication work. The committee alongwith the IQAC and the Principal motivates and encourages the teachers of senior College to participate in the research work. If a teacher opts and prepares the synopsis the committee gives its consent and scrutinizes the work and then gives consent for the further process for the preparation and submission of the proposals. The committee encourages organisation of conferences, workshops, seminars and to forward these proposals to UGC. The three new proposals for minor research projects were sent under the recommendations of the committee.

Recommendations of the Committee:

- 1) Every department must engage in research activities through Major / Minor / Ph.D. / M.Phill. supervisors / students' projects, etc.
- 2) Heads of the departments should create facilities and encourage the staff and students.
- 3) Every faculty member must publish research papers in peer reviewed journals.
- 4) The committee will inspire guidance for submission and receive grants from funding agencies.
- 5) The committee will encourage the non-Ph.D. staff to pursue for the doctorate.
- 6) The teachers will be asked to attend national and international conferences and present their papers.
- 7) The college should provide facilities of library, internet, laboratories, etc. for research activities.

Impact:

- 1) Out of 12 departments, 11 departments are actively engaged in research activities.
- 2) Almost every department has internet facility for students and teachers.
- 3) The library is well equipped with a massive collection of books, internet and INFLIBNET.
- 4) 90% of the teachers are involved in research and have published 204 papers. 27 teachers out of 33 are Ph.D. holders

- The institution Shri Shivaji Arts & Commerce College, Amravati is governed by Shri Shivaji Education Society, Amravati. - The management, the expert, the principal and the faculty come together for designing and applying the quality policy and plans.
- The principal of the college provides leadership. She is the academic officer. The principal forms various committees and their convenors for deciding the quality policy of the institution.
- The IQAC, the academic committee and the Principal develop strategies for academic development. The faculty members of various committees are actively involved in decision making process.
- The L.M.C. meeting is held once in a year. It includes the faculty members, one non-teaching member, four executive (management) committee members and Principal as the secretary. The L.M.C. members discuss and take decisions on academic, economic and physical infrastructure development issues of the college.

6.1.3 What is the involvement of the leadership in ensuring

- The Policy statements and action plans for fulfilment of the stated mission
- For fulfilment of the stated mission: The Principal ensures that the teaching, learning and evaluation policies of the institution go as per the schedule. The given curriculum is completed according to the academic calendar. That is reflected in the institution results. The Principal gives suggestions for improvement in teaching method. The academic committee implements and academic audit committee monitors the implementation of the suggestions.
- Formulation of action plans for all operations and incorporation of the same in the institutional strategic plan
- For the formulation of action plans for all operations, one L.M.C. meeting, IQAC meeting, IOAC and conveners of various committee meetings, IOAC and HoDs of

various department meetings are held during the academic session. The suggestions given by management, opinions of committee members in meetings are taken into consideration while formulating action plans for the institution.

Interaction with stakeholders

- The teachers, management committee members, students, parents, ex-students (alumni), non-teaching staff, public representatives, etc. are the stakeholders of the institutions. The leadership interacts with all stakeholders to bring desired results. The goals and objectives are given in the college prospectus and they are known by stakeholders. The institution invites parents, ex-students, public representatives in the social gathering function, alumni association meet, cultural activities, etc. These visits of the stakeholders are fruitful to the institution.
- Proper support for policy and planning through need analysis, research inputs and consultations with the stakeholders.
- The LMC is the apex body in the college and takes final decisions regarding academic, administrative and financial matters. The college council, however, is an academic body in the college to implement the decisions taken by the LMC.

Reinforcing the culture of excellence

- For reinforcing the culture of excellence in our college, various departments of the institutions ensure discipline, adopt innovative teaching methods, internal evaluation. The institution organises following activities.
- To organize guest lectures eminent scholars in higher education are invited to guide the students and teachers on various aspects of current trends in education.
- The college permits the faculty to attend orientation, refresher, short term courses, also gives permission to them to attend international, national and state level conferences, seminars and workshops.
- The college arranges workshop, seminars and conferences on various issues to update our knowledge.
- The college inspires the faculty member to participate and present research papers in conferences, seminars and encourages them to publish papers in international, national, peer reviewed journals and published the books. They are also encouraged to publish books.
- The college has a well equipped library, computer lab and English language laboratory. In the college library more than 75000 books, 35 printed journals, N.List Inflibnet facilities are available to teachers and students. E-journals and e-books are also available in the library.
- The college encourage the faculty to apply for minor and major research projects in UGC, ICSSR and other funding agencies.
- The students are felicitated for their academic, sports, cultural excellence.

- Through continuous interaction in college council meetings, interaction with staff members, attempts are made to bring about a vertical change into the organizational culture. There is effective co-ordination and monitoring mechanism to carryout various research, sport, cultural and extension activities.

- Our Parent management has specially appointed Director of Higher Education for our colleges. On the basis of NAAC, the society constituted SAAC (Shivaji Assessment and Accreditation Council). The top management and the Director of Higher Education of the parent society regularly interacts with the principal, coordinator of IQAC, faculty members and takes their issues for consideration.
 - The details of academic leadership are provided to the faculty by top management:
- The Executive Members of the parent Society regularly interacts with the head of the institution.
- One L.M.C. meeting is held in every academic session to discuss the problems and issues related to college academic, infrastructural and economic development.
- The parent management regularly through C.R. and A.P.I. of the faculty members takes yearly appraisal their performance.
- The Heads of the departments undertake the responsibility of academic and administrative work of their department.
- The college has formed various committees for academic and extracurricular activities.
- There are officers of N.C.C. and N.S.S. respectively for boys and girls unit.
- There is YCMOU study centre and special coordinator is appointed for the same.
- Every committee convener and member is responsible for their given work.

6.1.6 How does the college groom leadership at various levels?

- Under the present organizational structure, the principal is the sole head of the activities of the college.
- There is student council and meritorious students are selected as a student council member from each class. By the election process, one member is selected as University representatives. In the students council members are also nominated / selected from N.S.S., N.C.C. and Sports. Girls' representative is nominated by the student council committee and the principal.
- There are many different committees functioning in the College and every committee has convener.
- There is a physical director for games and sports activities. He is a regular faculty member.
- For administrative work office superintendent is appointed
- One post of a Librarian is sanctioned and filled accordingly. He is responsible for the smooth functioning of the library. However, these are internal arrangements, the final decision making power and the responsibility for each area lies with the principal.

6.1.7 How does the college delegate authority and provide operational autonomy to the departments / units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system?

The head of each department is given autonomy and responsibility for planning and implementation of the short term and long term plan of their department. For the teaching, paper-wise, unit-wise distribution of workload, planning of classroom, seminars and internal examination are the rights of Head of Departments. They are also empowered to form Study Association and organise guest lectures and form strategy for future development of the department, submit the major and minor research project proposals to UGC and other funding agencies, proposals for international, national and state level seminars, workshops and conferences. Because of this, efficient and effective leadership is carried out.

6.1.8 Does the college promote a culture of participative management? If yes, indicate the level of participative management.

- Yes. The society and the college achieve this through the various committees for promoting participative management. Shri Shivaji Education Society is a big education society in Maharashtra. It is the second biggest educational society in the state. It includes more than 270 branches. It is established by founder president Dr. Panjabrao alias Bhausaheb Deshmukh, the first Union Agriculture Minister of India. The society has elected a working body which includes one separately elected president, three vice presidents, one treasurer, four members and four co-opted members. Along with this the secretary is a separate post appointed by management of the society. At the society level there is decentralization of work.
- Shri Shivaji Arts & Commerce College formed various committees to promote a culture of participative management. There are 34 various committees working in the college.

Strategy Development and Deployment

L.M.C. is the major committee which gives and takes care of the college. The top management appointed an eminent person in higher education as director of higher education for colleges of the society. He guides and monitors the academic progress of the college from time to time. The convener and all the members of various committees do their work with devotion.

- College Council: The principal is the chairman and all regular faculty members are its members.
- o **IQAC:** The principal is the chairman, a senior faculty is nominated as its coordinator and member secretary, seven faculty as members, one representative of the executive council of the parent management, and one member as an expert nominated by the principal from outside, office superintendent is administrative officer and one non-teaching member as technical expert.
- Council of Heads: It consists of all the Heads of the departments as its members and the principal is its chairman.
- Students' Council: The Principal is the chairman, one faculty member nominated by the principal, one student from each class who has shown academic merit in UG and PG, one student representative each from NSS, NCC, sports and cultural fields, two lady representatives and a General Secretary who is elected from among the student representatives.
- Decision Making Process:
- o The quality enhancement plans, the financial policies and implementation policies are decided by the LMC

- o The decisions regarding the academic activities are taken in the college council which are subject to approval of the LMC
- The IQAC plans and suggests the process for implementing the various academic activities.
- The extracurricular activities are planned in consultation with the students' council.
- o Departmental academic and research activities are planned by the respective head of the department.

- Organised blood donation camp and actively participated in it.
- Home-economics department working for girls health awareness also participate in women empowerment work.
- Our teacher working on local bodies, cooperative bank, etc.

Human Resources Management

- LTC scheme as per government norms is granted.
- 80 to 90% of the staff avail the benefit of the above schemes.




